The allocation for Redcastle Family School for the academic year 2021 – 2022 is £18,510

How we have spent our Sports Premium funding to date:

- At Redcastle family school development of sport and physical activity is a key vision and aim for all students and we aim to encourage collaboration and partnership working to make the best use of our resources.
- We have enhanced and consistently kept our PE and sport provision to an outstanding level in order to raise participation and achievement for all pupils.
- We have undertaken a detailed PE and School Sport audit and developed our Sports Premium plan to raise high standards and to equip a large percentage in participation in PE throughout the school.
- Our rationale for the use of Sports Premium funding, which the Governors have agreed, are that it must be used so that:
 - All children benefit regardless of sporting ability
 - All children are given the opportunity to compete in tournaments with other schools with Breckland SSP, Active Norfolk, Aspire Sport, Community Sports Foundation and UEA (University of East Anglia). Opportunities for becoming a member of a sport team at Redcastle to compete comes through our after school clubs and PE lessons.
 - Every child has the opportunity to join extracurricular activities/sports after school (EYFS to Year 6).
 - All children have 3 hour lessons of Physical activity a week, including Forest school sessions implemented into our weekly timetable. Physical activity also available within lunch times with MSA's and the PE lead hosting tournaments, such as; Invasion Games, Net and ball and many more.
 - Staff have access to training opportunities and continued professional development
 - PE premium will fund PE and sport school trips that offer all children the opportunity to gain sporting memories and highlights in childhood.
 - Some activities may be subsidised so that pupils do not miss out due to financial constraints.
 - We make use of collaborative and partnership working with the above rationale in mind, and following the guidelines for how to spend this money, our spending history has been:
